Summary: As part of the City Council's Transformation Programme a new set of priorities are being developed with the aim of producing a new corporate plan for the Council to work to from 1st April 2010. Before the detailed work on the new corporate plan begins – Council is invited to consider two strategic themes upon which the more detailed and specific objectives, plans and targets that constitute a corporate plan can be based.

Recommendations:

- 1. That the Council approves the adoption of the two strategic themes of 'The Environment' and 'The Economy' as described below.
- 2. That Council notes that this is the beginning of a process that will result in a new strategic plan for the Council's consideration in due course effective from April 2010.

1. BACKGROUND INFORMATION AND OPTIONS

- 1.1 The Council's Transformation Programme includes the development of a new corporate plan designed around a new set of priorities. Attached at Appendix 1 is the report that the Executive considered at its meeting on 16 June 2009. That report includes the observations of the three Overview & Scrutiny Committees. Attached at Appendix 2 is the decision notice from the same meeting of the Executive.
- 1.2 Two priority themes are proposed. These are 'The Economy' and 'The Environment'. The nature of these themes is as follows.
- 1.3 **The Economy** This theme is about growing Carlisle for the future. The Appendix to the attached Executive report outlines some proposed long term strategic outcomes such as a diverse economy, decent and affordable housing, sustainable public transport and a thriving city centre. Many of the outcomes under this strategic theme can only be delivered though partnership making the most of the Council influencing and community leadership role. The Council's work with Carlisle Renaissance will be central to the success of the theme.
- 1.4 **The Environment** This theme is primarily about improving the places where people live. The intention is to develop ways of working more locally and flexibly to directly address those things that concern communities, citizens and businesses. The principle has been established with the area maintenance teams this can be grown and developed into a fundamentally new way of working where service delivery is shaped at a local level according to the needs of communities. The Executive propose that tackling these 'quality of life issues' at a local level can result in outcomes that build a sense of community with a positive impact in the longer term of key strategic concerns such as health and crime & disorder.
- 1.5 The agreement of these priority themes will set the scene for further work as officers develop the Corporate Plan. During this work extensive consultation with a wide range of stakeholders will ensure that *how* these priority themes are delivered reflects the needs and concerns of our communities, citizens and businesses.
- 1.6 The targets, measures and key projects outlines in the Appendix to the Executive report are intended to illustrate how the priorities could work. The Council is not being asked at this time to commit to actions at this level that detail will emerge as the corporate plan is developed.

1.7 In conclusion the proposed priority themes will set the tone for the development of a strategic plan containing clear and unambiguous priorities and objectives that guide decision-making for members and drive the work of the new management team.

Summary:

At its meeting of 5 May, the Executive considered report ref CE10/09 that outlined a transformation programme for the City Council. This report presents a more detailed consideration of what the proposed priorities of "economy" and "environment" might entail and how they may translate into service delivery. This is contained within appendix 1. Consultation has been undertaken with Corporate Resources, Community and Infrastructure Overview and Scrutiny Committees, the parish councils and local residents through Carlisle Focus and the website, and this will be tabled at the meeting.

Recommendations:

- 1. The Executive considers the work so far on the proposed priorities, mindful of the requirement for them to be "clear and unambiguous"
- 2. The Executive considers how the proposals are informed by the consultation
- 3. The Executive refers the proposals to a special meeting of Full Council, 29 June, for consideration and adoption
- 4. The Executive acknowledges that more detailed development of the proposals is required as the transformation programme progresses, and that this is done in collaboration with partners and with our local communities where there is opportunity to do so.

Reasons for recommendations:

To determine clear priorities for the City Council that will help us to restructure and refocus the organisation and that will be sufficiently robust to help lead Carlisle out of the recession.

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1. BACKGROUND

There is a requirement for the City Council to make significant financial savings, in common with much of the rest of local government and the wider public sector. We are embarking upon a programme of transformation that will restructure and refocus the organisation and this will be driven by a review of our corporate priorities.

We have had three priorities for a number of years: Cleaner, Greener, Safer, Learning City and Carlisle Renaissance and although we can demonstrate a number of significant achievements, the priorities have proved to be quite broad. Our ambition to continue to improve and to achieve more for our local communities means we need to determine a clearer focus and purpose for our organisation. The economic downturn is having a significant impact on Carlisle and the Council has a critical role to play in leading the City through recovery.

The priorities of the City Council should allow it to exercise its strategic and community leadership roles and should facilitate working in partnership to gain efficiencies and to improve local service delivery.

A number of the proposals outlined in Appendix1demonstrate how activities of the City Council would align with the Carlisle Partnership and support delivery of the Community Plan for Carlisle and the Cumbria Local Area Agreement. We are also mindful of the Duty to Involve and a number of the proposals may serve to develop a bigger role for local people in influencing decisions that affect them and helping to shape the places where they live.

REVIEW OF PRIORITIES

Pursuant to Minute EX.89/09 the Deputy Town Clerk and Chief Executive reported (PPP.26/09) on the Review of Priorities which was being carried out as part of the Transformation Programme. He set out for Members further details as to what the priorities of Economy and Environment might entail and how they may be translated into service delivery.

The Deputy Town Clerk and Chief Executive added that consultations on the Review of Priorities had been carried out with the three Overview and Scrutiny Committees and minute excerpts from those meetings were circulated for Members' consideration. He added that the Overview and Scrutiny Committees comments had been helpful and constructive. It was proposed that consideration of the priority areas should be carried out at a Special Meeting of the City Council on 29 June 2009 which would enable the Council to determine the priority areas. Further work would then be carried out to translate those priority areas into plans for delivery.

The Head of Policy and Performance set out for Members details of the consultation on the priority areas which had been carried out via the City Council Focus magazine and the Council's website and added that whilst responses to date had been limited, there was time to develop those consulations further. She also commented on consultations which had been carried out with other groups including staff, and the consortium which included the disability network Outreach and AWAZ.

The Deputy Town Clerk and Chief Executive added that there appeared to be support for the two priority areas which had been identified and support for the proposals to develop the area based teams around the priority for the Environment with the wider work of growing Carlisle included in the Economy priority.

Members considered the report and the consultations which had been carried out with groups including the Consortium but noted that there had been no consultation as yet with the Neighbourhood Forums. Members also noted that there were residents who would not be able to respond to the consultation process via the Council's website and Internet.

The Deputy Town Clerk and Chief Executive added that the Council would be asked to consider the recommendation to set the Council's priorities of Economy and Environment but recognised that more detailed work needed to be carried out on how the Council would deliver against those priorities. He suggested that the details of delivery would require further consultation and a significant amount of time would need to be spent in considering how the priorities could be best delivered.

The Leader commented that it was the right time for the Council to review its priorities and look to the future. In terms of the Environment the Council would need to consider how it could work with local communities to deliver that priority and in terms of the Economy the Council would need to look to see how it could help move Carlisle out of the recession. He added that the Council's existing priorities had delivered good results and Carlisle as a City had improved greatly. The Council would continue to work with the Carlisle Partnership and would support Carlisle Renaissance.
