OLD TOWN HALL & TOURISM INFORMATION CENTRE

Plans to carry out a programme of repairs and restoration to the fabric of the building and explore future utilisation and commercialisation of the Old Town Hall continue to be progressed.

An Overview and Scrutiny Task Group has now been formed to review the current service and look at options for future development of the Tourism Information Centre with a view to providing a more commercially orientated and modern service. This work will include members of the Task Group visiting Tourist Information Centre's in other parts of the North of England and reporting back to Overview and Scrutiny in late November. Their findings will then be considered in how future phases of development of the Old Town Hall are defined including the potential for external funding.

SUMMER PROJECTS

Summer Splash 2012 ran throughout the summer holiday period and attracted young people aged between 10-17 years at venues across the City. In mid August, the successful summer arts and performance project, which works particularly with mental health support groups, those recovering from substance misuse, people with disabilities and the long term unemployed, was run for the third year.

Sports Development

The City Council plays a key strategic role in ensuring a wide range of sporting opportunity is made available to all members of the community. It supports, commissions and monitors work through clubs, schools, Carlisle SPAA Foundation and Carlisle Leisure Ltd. Over a very busy summer period a sample of work includes:

- Developing a new volunteer scheme to offer young people the chance to volunteer in sports related opportunities. Links made with Streetgames to encourage young people to volunteer in their communities.
- Commissioning of a rounder's course at Carlisle Youth Zone to enable families to take up opportunities to play sport together.
- Work with Cumbria University to give students experience of delivering sports development in the community. They will organise sports events such as volunteer engagement and back 2 sports activities.

Talking Objects is a programme initiated by the British Museum to inspire engagement with museum collections by young people and encourage links with cultural and heritage sites in their area. It focused on a special object from the museum collection, the Celtic statue of the *Genii Cucullati*, (or Gods in Hooded Cloaks).
