Title:-	REVIEW OF POLLING ARRANGEMENTS

This Report presents the results of the annual review of polling arrangements and makes recommendations for changes to existing arrangements as appropriate.

The Report was considered by the Executive on 18th February and the relevant minute extract is attached. The suggestions regarding the use of Morton School and the Reading Room in Hayton as polling stations in the Yewdale and Hayton wards respectively have now been investigated as requested and revised recommendations have been made.

Recommendations:-

It is recommended to Council that

- a portacabin on the east side of Kingstown Road continue to be the polling place fro polling districts AE, PBK and PBN (paragraph 23);
- Thurstonfield Methodist Chapel be designated as the polling place for polling district NC (paragraph 25);
- Inglewood Infant School be designated as the polling place for district EB (paragraph 29);
- (4) Harraby Catholic Club be designated as the polling place for district ED (paragraph 29);
- (5) the polling arrangements for district CB remain unchanged (paragraph 33);
- (6) the polling arrangements for district PAU2 remain unchanged (paragraph 35);
- (7) Morton School be designated as the polling place for polling district LD (paragraph 38);
- (8) the Reading Room, Hayton be designated as the polling place for polling district PAA (paragraph 40);
- (9) the locations of all other polling places remain unchanged (paragraph 20);
- (10) the Returning Officer be given authority, after consultation with relevant Ward Councillors and Portfolio Holder, to change polling place locations at the City Council elections if the usual premises prove to be unavailable due to unforeseen circumstances (paragraph 41).

Introduction

- The Council has a statutory duty under the Representation of the People Act 1983 to divide its area into polling districts, to designate a polling place for each district and to keep both polling districts and polling places under review. The Departmental Service Plan provides for an annual polling review to be carried out and it has been the practice to review the arrangements each year in those wards having local elections in the following May.
- Under the Electoral Administration Act 2006, a full review of all parliamentary polling districts and polling places in the Council's area must be carried out during 2007 and every four years thereafter. Particular polling districts or places may be reviewed at any time. As the same polling places are used at local elections, any changes arising from the review will be implemented at the next local or parliamentary election in the ward concerned, whichever is the earlier.
- Notice of the review was published in the press and on the Council's website in September 2007 and representations invited by 26th October. All City Councillors have been consulted on the polling arrangements in their particular wards. The Returning Officer of every parliamentary constituency in the Council's area must also be consulted. The Returning Officer for the Penrith and the Border constituency, which currently includes all rural wards except Burgh and Dalston, had no comments to make. The current polling places are listed in the Appendix and these have been reviewed in the light of any representations received.

Statutory Provisions

In exercising its duty to keep polling districts and places under review, the 1983 Act requires Councils to seek to ensure that all electors have "such reasonable facilities for voting as are practicable in the circumstances". Each parish should be a separate polling district. 'Polling place' is not defined in the Act but it refers to the building or area in which the polling station is situated.

Access for Disabled Voters

The Act also says that a Council must "seek to ensure that so far as is reasonable and practicable every polling place is accessible to electors who are disabled". The effect of this requirement is that a building should not be designated as a polling place if the only means of access to any polling station situated in it would be by means of steps, when another more suitable building is available in the polling district. However, a building would not be a more suitable polling place if it is so far away from most of the electors in the area as to be inconvenient for them to reach it.

- 6 Under the Disability Discrimination Act 1995 it is unlawful for a service provider to discriminate against a disabled person. Discrimination includes refusing to provide any service to disabled people that it provides to non-disabled members of the public or providing a worse standard of service to disabled people than it provides to non-disabled people. Service providers have had to change practices, policies and procedures that make it impossible or unreasonably difficult for disabled people to use a service. Since October 2004 service providers have had to make reasonable adjustments to their buildings to overcome physical barriers to access.
- With the exception of portacabins, the majority of polling places are accessible to disabled voters and where there have been particular difficulties, temporary access ramps have been installed. Polling compartments specifically designed for voters in wheelchairs have also been provided. In addition, any disabled voter is entitled to assistance from the Presiding Officer or may be helped by a companion. Large versions of ballot papers are displayed in every polling station and devices are provided to assist blind or partially sighted voters cast their own vote. The Carlisle Access Group is being consulted on the current arrangements for disabled voters.

Free use of rooms

8 In addition to free use of school premises, described in paragraph 15 below, any room the expense of which is payable out of any rate may also be used free of charge. This would apply to a room in a local authority building e.g. a Community Centre.

Duties of Returning Officer

9 It is the responsibility of the Returning Officer to provide sufficient polling stations within each polling place and to allot electors to the stations as he thinks most convenient. One or more polling stations may be provided in the same room. The Returning Officer also has a duty to appoint the polling staff and provide the necessary equipment.

Review Criteria

- Apart from the requirements outlined above, there are no specific statutory criteria for determining the suitability of premises for election purposes or even the number of polling stations to be provided for a given electorate. The following factors, however, have been taken into account at previous reviews:
 - the convenience of the location within the polling district for the majority of electors
 - extent of parking provision

- internal size and layout of the premises having regard to the number of voters allotted to the polling station(s)
- lighting and heating
- proximity to public transport
- cost (where there is a choice between similar premises)
- The suitability of polling places are considered according to these criteria, taking account of the availability of alternative premises. An electorate of about 1000 1200 is a manageable number per polling station at a parliamentary election but the number of voters to be allocated to any particular polling place will have regard to the distribution and density of households within the Ward concerned.

Mobile Polling Stations

Where no suitable permanent buildings are available, mobile stations are used instead. Portacabins, however, are much less satisfactory than permanent premises - they offer limited space, lack facilities for the staff on duty, can present difficulties for disabled voters and are more expensive than halls or schools. Lighting is battery powered and not to the same standard as that provided by a mains supply. The availability of suitable accommodation is subject to commercial considerations and the commitments of suppliers to other longer term hirings. Improvements in the type of unit hired will, however, continue to be sought but continuity of supply is important, particularly in the event of a parliamentary election at short notice.

Use of Houses

- Following an earlier review, the Council agreed that no existing polling place should be replaced with a portacabin unless the premises concerned becomes unavailable and there is no suitable alternative. It was also agreed that, where appropriate, private houses and vacant Council property be used as alternatives to mobile stations, on the following basis:
 - The property is in a convenient location for the majority of electors in the polling district concerned;
 - There is sufficient time for due notice of the change in station to be given to electors and candidates;
 - · Signs are erected to show the changed location;
 - The condition of the property is satisfactory.

Empty Council houses have been used at previous elections in a number of wards and this practice continued following the transfer of the housing stock to Carlisle Housing Association, although they were under no statutory obligation to make their properties available. The Association, however, is no longer able to let their properties be used for election purposes due to the need to minimise the length of time properties are vacant between lettings.

Use of Schools

- The 1983 Act also provides for the use, free of charge, for the purpose of taking the poll or the counting of the votes of "a room in a school maintained or assisted by a local education authority or a school in respect of which grants are made out of moneys provided by Parliament", subject to making good any damage and defraying any expenses. These provisions also apply to grant maintained schools. There is no requirement that a school must close when part of it is being used as a polling station, but nearly all do so because of practical difficulties in staying open or on security grounds.
- 16 Closure for elections, however, can be disruptive to the school timetable and inconvenient for working parents. In response to requests from school governing bodies, the number of schools used as polling places has been reduced in recent years. There are now pressures on schools to meet performance targets and many feel that closure would be detrimental to their pupils' education. The Local Education Authority has made representations previously in support of this view and favours polling stations being sited elsewhere if at all possible.
- In the light of these concerns, the Council agreed at a previous review that suitable alternatives should be sought where schools are currently used as polling stations so that they would not have to close on election days. Only 9 schools in the Council's area are now used as polling venues. For the reasons given in paragraph 12 above, portacabins are not considered to be viable alternatives to school premises. A recommendation is made below, however, to use an additional school this year because no other suitable premises are available in the area concerned (paragraph 27).
- Belah School is the polling place for some 1100 electors in the BD district of Stanwix Urban ward. While the school will be available this year, alternative arrangements will need to be made following its closure in August 2008.

Review of Polling Places and Polling Districts

The large majority of polling places are satisfactory and have remained unchanged for many years. Choice of suitable buildings is limited and in most cases there is no alternative to the present arrangements. Change is therefore only proposed where the current premises are no longer available or satisfactory or representations have been received in respect of particular buildings.

Suggested changes in Belah, Burgh, Harraby, Hayton, St. Aidans, Stanwix Rural and Yewdale wards are discussed below. In the absence of representations in respect of any other wards, it is recommended that the polling arrangements in the following wards remain unchanged:

Belle Vue Dalston Morton
Brampton Great Corby & Geltsdale Stanwix Urban
Botcherby Irthing Morton
Castle Longtown & Rockcliffe Upperby
Currock Lyne Wetheral

BELAH WARD

- A portacabin sited near the Gosling Bridge has been used as the polling station for polling district AE (Belah ward), PBK (Stanwix Rural) and PBN (Stanwix Urban) since the closure of Newfield Grange Hotel in 2006 (see Map 1). A ward Councillor has suggested that Morrisons supermarket might be a possible alternative to this portacabin.
- While there would be advantages in terms of space and facilities in using a permanent building instead of a portacabin, it is considered that in this case they are outweighed by the drawbacks. The Gosling Bridge site is more conveniently situated for the majority of electors using this polling station, being within Belah ward itself and adjacent to Windsor Way which leads directly to districts PBN and PBK. Even if separate accommodation were made available within the premises, siting a polling station in a busy supermarket is likely to cause some confusion among those shoppers who were not entitled to vote there to the detriment to the smooth running of the poll.
- On balance, it is recommended that a portacabin on the east side of Kingstown Road continue to be the polling place for polling districts AE, PBK and PBN.

BURGH WARD

- 24 Ash House at Thurstonfield has been the polling place for the 352 electors in the Thurstonfield portion of Burgh Ward for a number of years (polling district NC – see Map 2). This private dwelling has recently changed hands and is no longer available for election use.
- The local Methodist Church Council has offered the use of its Chapel, which is located beside the small development at Chapel Field. The building is large enough to accommodate a polling station, has level access and a small adjacent car park. In the absence of other alternative premises in the village, it is recommended that Thurstonfield Methodist Chapel be designated as the polling place for polling district NC.

HARRABY WARD

- Both St. Elisabeth's Church Hall on Mayfield Avenue and Harraby Methodist Church Hall on Cumwhinton Road, the polling places for districts EB and ED respectively, have closed and are no longer available for election purposes (see Maps 3 and 4).
- St. Elisabeth's Church Hall was first used as a polling venue in 2002. Prior to that date, the polling place for district EB was Inglewood Infant School and, in the absence of any other suitable buildings in the locality, it is suggested that the school should once again be used as a polling station (see Map 3). The option of a portacabin is not recommended for the reasons set out in paragraph 12 above.
- There is no other building in district ED that could accommodate a polling station in place of Harraby Methodist Church Hall. (The Church itself might have been a possible option but it too has closed.) The most convenient alternative would be Harraby Catholic Club which is already used as the polling place for district EC (see Map 4). Although it is further away than the Methodist Church Hall for most electors concerned, a portacabin is not considered to be the better option, even if a more conveniently located site could be identified.

29 It is recommended:

- (a) that Inglewood Infant School be designated as the polling place for district EB;
- (b) that Harraby Catholic Club be designated as the polling place for district ED.

ST. AIDANS WARD

- 30 The polling place for the 1446 electors in polling district CB has been Norman Street School for many years (see Map 5). A representation has been received from the MP for Carlisle on behalf of a local resident that the polling station should be moved from the school so that it could remain open on election day. It is suggested that the electors concerned should transfer to Greystone Community Centre, which is already used as the polling place for district CD.
- While it is recognised that there are concerns about the closure of schools for the reasons given in paragraph 16 above, the convenience of the majority of electors in the area concerned is a major consideration when determining polling arrangements. It is considered that it would be less convenient for most electors in district CB, particularly those in the northern part of the ward (the Brunton Avenue/ Brunton Cresent/ Riverside Way area), if their polling station were moved to the Community Centre.

- There are currently 1634 electors in district CD allocated to the Community Centre. The addition of those who vote at the school would increase the total electorate at the Centre to over 3000 and put extra pressure on the Centre's facilities.
- 33 It is recommended that the polling arrangements for district CB remain unchanged.

STANWIX RURAL WARD

- Residents of Brunstock currently vote at the village hall in Houghton (polling district PAU2 see Map 6) which is also the polling place for Houghton itself. A ward Councillor has suggested that the proximity of the Houghton Hall Garden Centre might afford the opportunity to provide a more convenient polling station for Brunstock electors. The garden centre is certainly closer to the village than Houghton but the distance to the current polling station is no greater than for many other electors in the rural part of the City. It is considered that the number of electors concerned does not justify a separate polling station for Brunstock and that the existing facilities are reasonable.
- 35 It is therefore recommended that the polling arrangements for district PAU2 remain unchanged.

YEWDALE

- A portacabin sited on the paved area between Nairn Way and Egerton Grove is the polling place for the 1400 electors in polling district LD (see Map 7). This polling district includes the new development at the Beeches off Wigton Road and a ward Councillor has suggested that, as this estate is some distance from the current polling station, separate provision should be made for the electors concerned and proposed Morton School as a possible venue. This would not only provide a more convenient polling station for residents of the Beeches but would reduce the number voting at the portacabin.
- While it is accepted that the estate is geographically detached from the rest of the polling district, it is considered that the 305 electors currently resident there are insufficient to merit their own polling station – it would be the smallest separate polling station in the urban area. Even if all electors to the south of Queensway were included, being those who may find the school slightly more convenient than the portacabin, there would only be 448 allocated to the new polling station which is still considered to be too few to justify extra provision.

Suttle House and it has been suggested that some electors are deterred from voting at the portacabin due to restricted parking provision. There may therefore be some merit in relocating the polling station for all electors in polling district LD. The school can make accessible accommodation available at the front of the school which would offer much improved facilities when compared with a portacabin and would also allow the school to function normally on polling day. It is therefore recommended that Morton School be designated as the polling place for district LD.

HAYTON WARD

- The polling place for the Hayton portion of Hayton ward has been the Womens' Institute Hall in the village since 2001 (polling district PAA see Map 8), the school having been used before then. The Hall, however, has now closed and is no longer available for election use. The alternative venues are the school or the Reading Room, which is owned by the Parish Council and used regularly by the local playgroup. The school is more centrally located but, in order to avoid the need for its closure on polling day, the Reading Room is considered to be a suitable option.
- 40 It is recommended that the Reading Room, Hayton be designated as the polling place for polling district PAA.

OTHER POLLING PLACES

Although the usual booking requests have been sent in respect of polling stations to be used at the City Council elections in May, confirmation of availability has not yet been received for all premises. In order to ensure that polling stations are provided for all electors, it is recommended that the Returning Officer be given authority, after consultation with relevant Ward Councillors and Portfolio Holder, to change polling place locations at the City Council elections if the usual premises prove to be unavailable due unforeseen circumstances.
