Summary: The report presents the performance of the City Council for the first quarter, 2009/10 for the service areas covered by the Panel. Wherever possible, the most recent performance is included, i.e. to July 2009. Measures from the National Indicator Set (NIS) are included along side local performance indicators. Place Survey results and our subsequent reports from BMG remain elusive; a new release date has been given by Government for September.

Questions for input required from Overview and Scrutiny:

- 1. Consider the performance of the City Council as presented in the report with a view to seeking continuous improvement in Council services.
- 2. Comment on the presentation of the information in Covalent and any changes required in order to improve understanding and usefulness of the data.
- 3. Provide feedback on the usefulness of the National Indicators as part of the continuing review of the performance framework.

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1. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Work on fitting a performance framework to the priorities 'economy' and 'environment' is at a very early stage of development. The Senior Management Team has agreed to retain the current key performance indicators until the new priorities and associated performance framework are developed more fully in a corporate plan.

The overall measure of performance 'Use of Resources Assessment' 2008/2009 is reaching its final stages with relevant officers completing Key Lines Of Enquiry. As part of the assessment of Data Quality and Performance Management the Audit Commission has identified two national indicators for detailed analysis. The two indicators in question are 'NI 155 - Number of affordable homes delivered (gross)' and 'NI 191- Residual household waste per household'.

2. PERFORMANCE OVERVIEW

2.1 Customer satisfaction and opinion

We are still awaiting our Place Survey report from BMG Research; the national delay in releasing the data has pushed the delivery date back to sometime in early September at the latest. The national results from the Place Survey were published on 23rd June, a link to published results can be found at:

These indicators have been coded and added to Covalent. It is worth noting that four of the indicators (BV119a,c,d,e) are replicas of the Best Value User Satisfaction Survey, namely:

BV119a satisfaction with sports/leisure facilities BV119c satisfaction with museums / galleries BV119d satisfaction with theatres and concert halls BV119e satisfaction with parks and open spaces

The information for these indicators was included in the End of Year Report. The downward trend is now confirmed across all these comparable indicators. Compared to all the districts in England we fall into the lowest group for satisfaction with keeping public land clear of litter and refuse; refuse collection; and theatres and concert halls. Satisfaction with museums and galleries places us in the best performing group.

3. Priorities

3.1 Cleaner, Greener, Safer

All the safer indicators are on target and showing a short term improvement trend. For example, the number of criminal damage (LI305a) incidents recorded in July was the second lowest monthly figure since April 2008. The under performance of the timely removal of abandoned vehicles needs to be seen in the context of the small numbers of abandoned vehicles involved.

3.2 Learning City

The downward trend in 'promoting access to learning' is monitored by teams working on the Learning City priority. Poor performance is being addressed with a significant amount of marketing and redesign of services and projects.

4 Carlisle Area Assessment

4.1 Safer and Stronger Communities (Carlisle)

The majority of national indicators from the Place Survey fall into the thematic group 'Safer and Stronger Communities'. It is worth noting that crime and disorder remains the single most important issue for people in making somewhere a good place to live. However it is no longer in the top three of issues that most need improving in the local area. We fall into the lowest group compared to all the Districts in England for:

- NI 1 % of people who believe people from different backgrounds get on well together in their local area
- NI 3 Civic participation in the local area
- NI 6 Participation in regular volunteering

We fall into the best group compared to all the Districts in England for:

- NI 4% of people who feel they can influence decisions in their locality
- NI 21 Dealing with local concerns about anti-social behaviour and crime issues by the local council and police
- NI 27 Understanding of local concerns about anti-social behaviour and crime issues by the local council and police
- NI 37 Awareness of civil protection arrangements in the local area


4.2 Adult Health and Well-being (Carlisle)

The remaining Place Survey indicators fall into Adult Health and Well-being, with NI 140, Fair Treatment by Local Services, falling into a sub group entitled 'Tackling Exclusion and Promoting Equality.'

Satisfaction of people over 65 with both home and neighbourhood is in the best group compared to all the Districts in England.

Fair treatment by local services is in the lowest group compared to all the Districts in England.
