Establishes a community launderette to address hygiene poverty & social isolation


Incorporates the 10m pool in a new health & hydrotherapy centre



Reduce Hygiene Poverty

afford household appliances like a washing
machine

Using a launderette is 2,561% more expensive

- Similar scale to James
 Street Baths
- Pools in use at time of refurbishment
- Re-purposed as health and wellbeing suite
- New entrance created
- Community Launderette established
- GLL operated

Borderlands Funding

£600k for the demolition of 1970s, £200k for making good external walls & £200k to enable the building to remain operational. Conditional on pools site transferring to Borderlands

Recommendations

- 1. Recommend to Executive that the Friends Group be allowed 8-10 months to complete the AHF funded feasibility study & business plan (RIBA stage 1) before Council progresses to Community Consultation, Order of Costs and Economic Appraisal/Outline Business Case
- 2. Recommend that budget be allocated to enable the Turkish Baths to continue to operate until 1970 Pool is scheduled for demolition
- 3. Recommend to Executive that officers work with the Friends Group to explore a Community Asset Transfer and progress options for the James Street Public Baths; and provide an update to the August meeting of the Health and Wellbeing Scrutiny Panel
