Summary:

The report sets out for Member's information the consultation exercise undertaken and the process to lead to the setting of an annual programme of Reviews/Inquiries for 2002/03.

Recommendations:

The committee:-

- 1. Notes the agreed process for producing an annual programme of Subject Reviews/Inquiries.
- Agrees that all other consultation suggestions be referred to the Executive, Chief
 Officers and Heads of Service with a view to appropriate matters being addressed in
 future policy development and service planning.
- 3. Agrees that Chief Officers raise consultation responses outwith the authority's responsibility with appropriate partner organisations.

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1. Background

- 1.1 As Members are aware Subject Reviews/Inquiries form an important part of the work of Overview and Scrutiny Committees. These reviews give the opportunity to consider a topic in some depth over a number of meetings.
- 1.2 As Members will also recall it was agreed that consultation should take place to elicit ideas for suitable review topics in line with Best Practise.
- 1.3 Consultation has taken place with Members, staff and the Citizens Panel. Overview and Scrutiny Support staff have also put forward suggestions drawn from their own experience and from issues which seem topical in light of the authority's policy agenda.

2. Annual Programme

- 2.1 It is suggested that since, although important, this forms only one element of the committees' work it would be prudent not to set a programme that is too ambitious. Based on last year's work, and on experience elsewhere, it is suggested that each committee should programme one large, one medium and one to two small reviews for the year.
- 2.2 Should progress with the programme and officer capacity allow then further topic (s) could be added in during the year.

3. Decision Process

- 3.1 As previously agreed each Overview and Scrutiny Committee will consider the results of the consultation exercise in a Workshop Session. These will follow-on from the first formal meetings of the Civic Year. Also, as previously agreed, these Workshop Sessions will include substitute members of the committee.
- 3.2 The workshop will be facilitated by the Overview and Scrutiny support staff and will identify the particular committee's priorities from the various suggestions, which have come out of the consultation process.
- 3.3 Once each committee has completed their workshop then all the outcomes will be reported to the next meeting of this committee. This committee will then be able to agree an overall programme for the year bearing in mind the suggested make-up of that programme as set out in the previous paragraph and also reflecting the committees own views on the priorities which have emerged. The respective Committee Chairmen will obviously be able to input their committee's views to aid that discussion.

4. Outcomes of the Consultation

- 4.1 In addition to Members' responses there were 231 from the Citizens Panel and 39 from staff. Similar suggestions have been brought together to give a composite consultation report.
- 4.2 For the committee's information the outcomes of the consultation are attached as

the Appendix to this report. The suggestions are listed by reference to the respective committee under whose remit they fall. There are also, as expected, a number, which are crosscutting in nature, and these have been grouped together. The lists identify the proposed subject and give some supporting detail; the source of the suggestion is given, as is the likely scale of the review and the portfolio under which it falls. There is also a brief comment intended to provide relevant background information.

4.3 It is proposed that each of the three committees consider the crosscutting reviews to see if any are regarded as priorities. This committee can then take account of that, and if it wishes, allocate that review to a particular committee when it agrees the overall programme.

5. Sharing Consultation Results

- 5.1 Although guidance was given to consultees it was never expected that all suggestions would be suitable as potential reviews. This did not discourage this approach since all concerns expressed in this way are a valuable contribution to the authority's programme of consultation.
- 5.2 Indeed it is suggested that the various ideas, which are not chosen for review, should be referred to the Executive, Chief Officers and Heads of Service. Along with the request that Portfolio Holders and responsible officers discuss them with a view to appropriate matters being addressed in future policy development and service planning.
- 5.3 Some issues raised are outwith this authority's responsibility (e.g. County Council matters) and it is also suggested that Chief Officers refer these on to partner organisations.

6. Recommendations

The committee:-

- 1. Notes the agreed process for producing an annual programme of Subject Reviews/Inquiries.
- 2. Agrees that all other consultation suggestions be referred to the Executive, Chief Officers and Heads of Service with a view to appropriate matters being addressed in future policy development and service planning.
- 3. Agrees that Chief Officers raise consultation responses outwith the authority's responsibility with appropriate partner organisations.
