	Recommendation	Update on Action
1.	That the Council continue to lobby Government to ensure that an appropriate amount of funding is secured to satisfy DFG demand in Carlisle.	Through membership of the DCLG (Department of Communities and Local Government) Working Group on the Modernisation of DFGs, the City Council continuing to lobby on behalf of all authorities in Cumbria for further funding. This effort is mainly focused on helping DCLG officials lobby DH (Department of Health) for further funding and helping them prepare the next CSR bid to Treasury. This effort successfully raised an additional £20m nationally from DH for DFGs, bringing in a further £54k to Carlisle. These additional monies would have been larger but the money was allocated in January too late in the year for us to be able to spend it before year end. We are lobbying DH and DCLG to try to ensure any additional monies from DH are provided earlier in the year.
2.	That the Executive give consideration to allocating some or all New Homes Bonus Grant to the DFG budget.	As part of the Council budget resolution for 2012/13 put forward by the Executive to Full Council and passed on the 7/2/12 an increase in capital funding for DFG's was identified. This was for £200,000 per annum in order to meet expected demand. The DFG capital grant from central government is £663,000 for the financial year 2012/13 and with the additional £200,000 per annum the overall budget is £863,000.

That a clear reporting procedure is developed between Riverside, Social Care and the Council so that the Council is fully aware of all DFG cases from referral to completion to comply with its statutory duty in the provision of major adaptations.	In 2011 Riverside Housing undertook a review of disabled adaptations within their housing stock and as a result they have implemented a number of actions from the review. This has included referrals being made directly to them by Occupational Therapists (OT's) in relation to their tenants where an assessment has been made for a disabled adaptation. An agreed process has been put in place whereby a list of all referrals received by Riverside Housing from OT's is passed to the Council on a monthly basis.

		As a first step in this process, Carlisle has been accredited as a Home Improvement Agency
		(HIA) by Foundations, the national body for HIAs. This has given Carlisle access to additional
		funding streams and increased the range of options available to clients needing help. The
		support available from Foundations will also help develop the service to nationally recognised

		standards. It is expected that through Foundations, DH will be providing monies for a
		Handyperson Service later in the year, which will only be available to accredited HIAs such as
		Carlisle. This will as in other areas be a chargeable service so will be self funding. We are in
		discussions with partners on a preferred model and exploring the possibility of additional seed
		corn funding.
		We are also working with Health and Social Care locally to develop Hospital Discharge
		Services in partnership with Riverside Careline service. Discussions are ongoing with a view to
		providing additional funding for DFGs from Health budgets in 2013-14; possibly on a call off
		contract basis.
