Response:

Reduced penalties for early settlement of enviro-crime offences

As a guiding principle, enforcement action must be seen to be reasonable and proportionate. Penalties must be set in line with legislation and enforcement practice should be built around relevant codes of practice for the sector. Fixed Penalty Notices (fines) should be a realistic alternative to prosecution through the magistrates' courts. The option of a reduced penalty for early settlement is effective in helping to bring matters to a swift and efficient conclusion, yet still provides the necessary teeth to reflect the offence committed. Such an approach may also help strengthen cases which proceed to court, demonstrating that the Council has been reasonable and proportionate in its action.

Where penalties are not paid, cases will be referred to the courts. Payment of a penalty avoids the risk of a larger fine and a criminal record. Examples of court outcomes provided below:

December 2021 status: 46 cases are currently awaiting hearing in the magistrates' court, covering a range of offences - littering, dog fouling, micro-chipping of dogs, fly-tipping.
