1.0 Background Information

- 1.1 The Executive considered Report DS.05/09 North Pennines AONB Management Plan 2009-14 on the 17 January 2009 and referred the Report to the Infrastructure Overview and Scrutiny Committee.
- 1.2 The Infrastructure Overview and Scrutiny Committee considered the Report on the 22 January 2009 but made no observations on the content apart from stations at Wetheral and Brampton were missing from the document map and references to ECCP would need to be deleted.
- 1.3 Since preparing the original report the North Pennines AONB Unit had considered the detailed comments and the proposed amendments had been translated into the Action Plan. 1.0 BACKGROUND INFORMATION AND OPTIONS

- 1.1 Executive Report DS.05/09 sets out the background to the responsibilities for the preparation of a Management Plan for the North Pennines AONB. Members considered this report at their meeting on the 19th January and referred the report to Infrastructure Overview and Scrutiny Committee. The Committee considered the report but made no observations on the content apart from stations at Wetheral and Brampton missing from the document map.
- 1.2 Since preparing the original report the North Pennines AONB Unit have considered the detailed comments and officers have detailed schedules of the responses to all issues raised an proposed amendments to the draft Management Plan. In detail these have been translated into the Action Plan which forms part C of the Management Plan. The amended Action Plan is attached to this report and will form the key component of the Management Plan setting out actions for all partners.
- 1.3 No issues are raised specifically for Carlisle City Council although there are a number of actions alongside other local authorities with responsibilities for the AONB. The main responsibilities relate to the Local Development Framework and planning matters to ensure that the important qualities of the AONB are recognised, protected or enhanced. In addition the modifications will require the City Council as partner to assist in the preparation of guidance on issues ranging from landscape character analysis to assessment of geological and geomorphological sites.
- 1.4 The preparation of planning guidance and other work is resourced from the Local Plans and Conservation Section unless specialist advice is required and the North Pennines AONB unit are able to call on the expertise within the 5 local authorities in the first instance.
- 1.5 In order to progress the preparation of the Management Plan for the AONB Members are asked to forward the amended plan to Council for adoption. When considering the adoption of the Management Plan attention is drawn to paragraph 6.3 of Planning Policy Statement 12 on Local Spatial Planning. This refers to the production of supplementary guidance which may be considered as material in planning matters. Whist this does not achieve the status of formal Supplementary Planning Documents (SPD) the appropriate consultation and sustainability appraisal work has been undertaken and its status as supplementary guidance would be appropriate when the Management Plan is adopted.

1. CONSULTATION

2.1 Consultation to Date.

A draft of the report was prepared for consultation during September/October 2008. Over 800 comments have been received. Infrastructure Overview and Scrutiny Committee has been consulted on this report.

2.2 Consultation proposed. No further consultation is proposed.

2. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

That the Consultation draft Management Plan as amended by responses to consultation be referred to Council for consideration to adopt.

3. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

In order to fulfil the statutory responsibilities for AONB Management the Management Plan is required to be adopted by all constituent local authorities.

1. BACKGROUND INFORMATION AND OPTIONS

- 1.1 The introduction of the Countryside and Rights of Way (CRoW) Act 2000 increased the status of Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty and placed their management on a more formal basis. This also brought a statutory responsibility for the local authorities whose areas contain AONBs to put adequate measures in place to ensure the future protection of those high quality landscapes. The North Pennines Partnership is established to undertake management responsibilities for the AONB involving all constituent local authorities and private sector representatives with local interest.
- 1.2 In 2004 the CRoW Act required all Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty to have a Management Plan prepared for a five year period which would establish the objectives and priorities for work over that period. This initial period finishes at the 31st March 2009 and a new Management Plan is required to be in place for the following 5 years.
- 1.3 The North Pennines Partnership has undertaken a large amount of work on preparing the new Management Plan with officers from each area assisting and advising on the preparation. A consultation draft has been prepared and is appended to this report.
- 1.4 As nine Local Authorities cover the AONB area the preparation of joint documents such as the Management Plan is complex. This is further complicated by Local Government Reorganisation in Northumberland and Durham County areas. In order to put in place a new Management Plan by the 31st March 2009 the Management Plan must be reported to City Council at its 3rd March meeting.
- 1.5 Following consultation, the full analysis of comments and changes to the Plan are still being worked on and will not be available until the 2nd February. A more detailed report on changes to this draft for the final version will be available for the Executive meeting on the 16th February meeting.
- 1.6 Members are asked to consider the attached draft Management Plan and refer this initial report to Infrastructure Overview and Scrutiny Committee for consideration prior to the final version being available.

2. CONSULTATION

2.1 Consultation to Date.

One draft of the report was prepared for consultation during September/October 2008. Over 800 comments have been received.

2.2 Consultation proposed.

No further consultation is proposed.

3. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

That the draft management plan is reported to Infrastructure Overview and Scrutiny Committee for their consideration and a further report is presented to this committee on the final version of the 2009-14 Management Plan.
