Subject Matter

The Communities and Housing Portfolio Holder submitted report CD.34/12 presenting the Carlisle and Eden Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership (CDRP)'s work programme for the coming year in the form of their Partnership Plan.

The work programme would be developed throughout the year by the CDRP's Leadership Group, upon which the City Council was formally represented, and in response to intelligence received on an ongoing basis.

The Communities and Housing Portfolio Holder referred Members to the new Partnership Plan, attached at Appendix 1 to the report, which formed part of the Council's Policy Framework and replaced the existing plan (2011/12). She expressed the view that it was essential that feedback continued to be received to ensure that the Plan was working. The Plan would therefore be reviewed on an annual basis, and she expressed thanks to the Officers who had compiled the document.

In conclusion, the Communities and Housing Portfolio Holder moved the recommendations set out in the report, which were seconded by the Culture, Health, Leisure and Young People Portfolio Holder.
